The Fine Arts Plaza is really taking shape fast and it is easy to see what a terrific improvement it will be to the Bowlus Fine Arts Center. Accessibility has been one of the greatest disadvantages of the building for years, but now everyone will be able to access the facility and enjoy what it has to offer. The elevator has been installed and the brick work is flying up when weather conditions allow. The crews will soon be working on the EIFS (synthetic stucco) which covers the remaining exposed green board, and installation of the glass and doors in the new entry will follow. That's the good news.

Here's the not-so-good news. Recently we discovered that the entire length of the alley running east and west behind the building will need to be reconstructed. This work is necessary to control the flow of rain water off of the new roof and to direct any water run off away from our neighbors to the south. Hofer & Hofer has provided a plan for the work but since it was not a part of the original contract, a change order will be required and the cost will be added to the project's total.

The City of lola has generously agreed to help by tearing out the old asphalt and preparing the alley for the concrete work. This will provide a significant savings to the Friends. The remaining cost for the concrete and labor required to complete the alley project has been estimated at \$50,000. While the Friends have some money set aside to cover unplanned expenses such as this, they are unable to cover the full cost of the alley project AND still pay for the highest priority elements in and around the parking area. Additionally, a portion of their funds (just over \$10,000) have been designated toward specific elements within the plaza such as landscaping, benches, or the musical garden feature, and can not be used to pay for other expenses.

The bottom line is that the Friends must raise an additional \$45,000 in order to complete the alley project and complete the other priority projects - including irrigation, sod installation, basic landscaping, and signage - in the spring and early summer.

I hope you will consider what you can do to contribute to this project. Cumulative gifts totaling \$1,000 or more will be recognized on a very special donor wall in the new addition. Cumulative gifts totaling \$500-999 will be also be recognized on a permanent display.

A FAMILY TRADITION!

Three generations of the Gilpin family have considered themselves not only grateful beneficiaries of the Bowlus Trust, but "friends" of Mr. Bowlus and the amazing center for fine arts that he has provided for the children of lola and citizens of the area.

Following the Gilpin family tradition of gifts to the Friends of the Bowlus, Karen and Jim donated \$3,000 to the plaza project very early on - in late 2015. Last year after their names were drawn as cash prize winners for a Rotary organization fundraiser, they directed the not-forprofit to send another \$1,000 of their winnings to the Friends. "The plaza project on the east side really looks great and will greatly improve access to the building," Jim said. "I think Mr. Bowlus would be pleased!"

We think Jim's mother, Helen, would be pleased as well. While in her 80s, business-minded Helen Gilpin set up an annuity which paid a life



insurance policy listing the Friends of the Bowlus as the sole beneficiary. Upon Helen's death in 2012, the Friends received \$155,000 which provided a significant boost to funding in the project's very earliest stage of planning.

Rotary is a global network of 1.2 million neighbors, friends, leaders, and problem-solvers who see a world where people unite and take action to create lasting change – across the globe, in our communities, and in ourselves. (Note: Thomas H. Bowlus was a long-time Rotarian also!) We are grateful that the Gilpin's have chosen to support their community through Rotary International and for generously directing this additional gift to the plaza project!

Progress Report!

Crews took full advantage of some unseasonably warm days in January to build the cinder block structure for the storage area, pour concrete for the new loading dock,



and lay brick on the tall beams supporting the new roof structure.



By February 15, the green board was up in preparation for the EFIS (Exterior Insulation and Finish System). The finished surface will be painted a neutral tone and will look similar to stucco. Heavy coats were shed and the guys enjoyed some "short sleeve" weather -- whistling while they worked!



The very next week, frigid temperatures and ice "froze" progress on the project.







It's now mid-March and all of the brick work has been completed and sealed. A decorative screen wall mimics the design of the courtyard wall and former portico and will conceal the outdoor storage area and loading dock from view from the new entry.



The EFIS crew is on site and will be working the next couple of weeks on the exterior. A section of the alley will be excavated and new concrete poured during spring break week while students are out of the building. Windows and doors for the new entry are scheduled for delivery the last week of March.
